The Loss of a Dear Friend & Matriarch

Caroll VanDeventer will forever be missed



Caroll VanDeventer was a dear friend of the PPOK organization. More than just a friend, she loved people; She loved photography and the artistry of it; She loved the next generation of artists.

She, with her husband

Bob, were a part of the PPOK organization since the 1970s. They opened a studio in Cleveland, OK in 1981 in the upstairs area of one of the buildings- because it was the only vacancy on Broadway at the time.

Knowing their last name of VanDeventer wasn't catchy enough for business, Caroll saw the word "vanguard" one day, which means 'to lead the way by moving forward'.

Since they were branching out on their

own together, the name was a perfect fit and Vanguard Photography was born.

While Bob had taught himself the photography side mentoring under his friend Glen Nelson,



Caroll learned to hand-color and retouch his photographs and negatives so the two could work together. He worked at the studio and she was at home, raising their 3 children and doing the hand-coloring and retouching in her painting room.

Their business became an icon for photography in the area photographing schools, dignitaries, police academy cadets, Osage Tribal Council members and numerous weddings.

Caroll was known for her Master Artist skills. She was a gifted artist and did hundreds of touch-ups and colorizations on black and white portraits. Between the 2 of them their work earned numerous awards through their decades in business.

As a couple, Bob was a Master Photographer, Craftsman; Caroll a Master Artist, Craftsman and together, they received the highest honor given by Professional



Photographers of America twice - in 1983 (Southwest Professional Photographers Association) and again in 1993 (PPOK).

You could always find Caroll in the print room during the annual image competitions She kept everything running behind the scenes in this room like a well-oiled machine. She welcomed members in and mentored so many of us in that room.

The Nelson-Helt scholarship was presented by her at every annual banquet since it's creation in 1999. It is an award that was near and dear to her heart. The annual award presented to the highest scoring first time entrant. She championed the next generation of hard-working photographers, and so many were blessed to have had her as their cheerleader.

In 2018 PPOK changed the name of the annual Artist High Print award to the VanDeventer award. She was also honored with the Artisan's Life Achievement Award with Professional Photographers of America.

She had the best smile, and most welcoming hug; followed with the sweetest quick wit and sense of humor. She will forever be missed and our organization was incredibly blessed to have had her as a matriarchal example of how to champion each other as photographers.

Tony is a technical star, and he begins every project from the scientific point of view before he goes into the visual aspect of what is needed for obtaining the final results.

These two great minds and photographic leaders are best friends. They have been



since they first met in the late 80's at the exact time Joe's talents were taking him higher and higher in photography at Kraft Foods and Tony's talents were taking him from West Texas to California and international stages.

These friends

now find themselves living 45 minutes from each other after having spent most of their careers 3,000 miles apart.

Join us as Tony and Joe have an almost Fireside Chat discussion about how you have to nurture and feed both sides of the brain in order to see real movement and progress in your work. We'll dispel some myths and rumors about lighting and reveal simple truths during the discussion.

Making and Selling Art Photography

Dennis Chamberlain Corrales, NM




What are the best options and approaches for selling your art photography? How should you decide which of your thousands of photographs have the best chance in the highly competitive art market (which is soon to be flooded by AI Art from non-artists)? What presentation methods should you use - traditional framed prints or something else? Should your selling strategy be that you are selling "Wall Art" or is it "Fine Art"?

These topics, plus a short segment covering "extreme creativity" and the tools I use, will be the focus of this presentation. Dennis has 17 years of experience on "both sides of the aisle", having been president of the Corrales Arts Center for three years and the president and board member of a local Co-Op gallery for several years prior

to that.

Dennis knows innumerable artists of all types, most of whom view their artistry as a part-time endeavor while for many it is a full-time profession. Dennis will also demonstrate the challenges of transitioning from being a "part





time" to a "full-time" artist.

Dennis sells his artwork in galleries and shows in Northern New Mexico, including Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Bernalillo, Madrid and Corrales.

He is the son of a lifetime Eastman Kodak employee, growing up in Rochester, New York. He was given his first medium format camera (a "hand me down" from his father) when he was seven. Still, he didn't take photography seriously until the year 2000, and started a part-time portrait business shortly thereafter.

Things evolved into a full-time focus on Southwestern Art photography when he moved to New Mexico in 2007, and this emphasis continues to this day.

Dennis holds the degrees of Master Artist, Master Photographer, Certified Professional Photographer, Photographic Craftsman, and Educational Associate from the PPA and ASP organizations.

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
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
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
